There are two primary ways that the University will communicate with you:

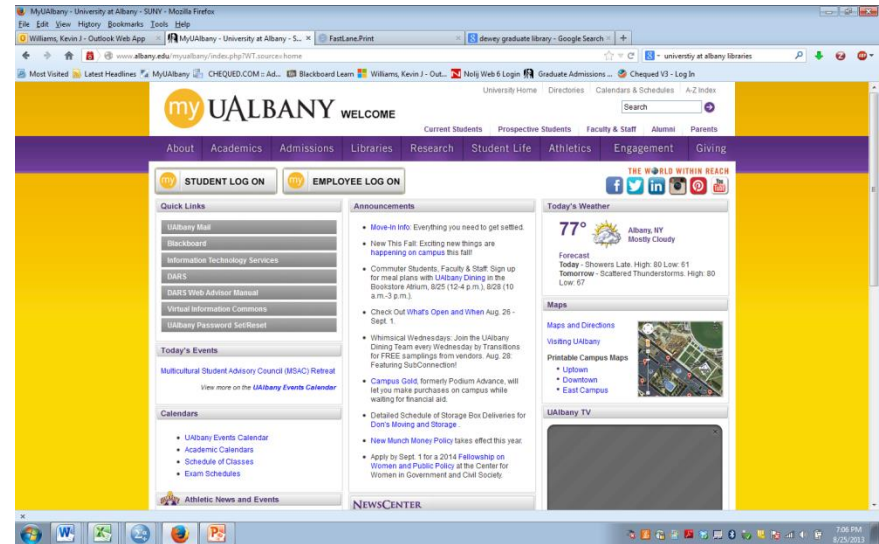
- The myUAlbany web portal (www.albany.edu/myualbany) brings many of the University's services to your fingertips

UAlbany Mail



All students receive a UAlbany Mail account. Email is the official means of campus communication so please access your albany.edu email on a routine basis.

All messages from the University (and your department) will be sent to your UAlbany Mail address.

A recent upgrade to UAlbany Mail has increased the size of mailboxes to 25GB. Each mailbox has a recipient rate limit per mailbox for a 24-hr period of 10,000 recipients.

II. Academics

The University offers over 140 graduate programs leading to advanced certificates, master's and doctoral degrees. These programs are spread over nine schools and colleges, and several of our programs are ranked near the top in the nation. A full listing of the academic programs at UAlbany can be found on the [Graduate Education website](#).

Each program has its own curriculum, but there are general regulations that apply to all graduate students. The Dean of Graduate Education, the Office of Graduate Education, and the Graduate Academic Council exercise general responsibility for graduate study, admissions and for university-wide policies, procedures, requirements, and standards of graduate study.

The role of these units is to support the academic standards of the University and the quality and validity of the degrees it confers and to ensure fair and equitable treatment of all students engaged in graduate study. Academic regulations are specified in the Graduate Bulletin (to be discussed shortly).

Graduate Program Administration

The development, promotion, and operation of individual programs and the advisement and interests of students in them are a primary responsibility of the individual schools and departments that provide the graduate instruction. Each program should offer orientation programs for their new students, providing students with specific details on program requirements, curriculum, and milestones. Departments also assign advisors to incoming students. Please check with your department about the assignment of an advisor, if you have not already been assigned one.

Establishing a healthy relationship with your graduate program advisor is often a key to success in graduate school. Make the effort – it will be worth it!

Each term you will need to discuss future enrollment plans and obtain an Advisement Verification Number (AVN) from your advisor in order to gain access to register for classes in the next semester.

Graduate Bulletin

The Graduate Bulletin provides information about degree requirements, academic regulations and policies that apply to all graduate students, and the program curriculum to which you have been admitted. The Bulletin also provides course descriptions for your program. The official bulletin is published online and is updated on a regular basis. The Graduate Bulletin is meant to be a reference during your study to answer questions that may arise. Please consult it regularly. Also, as a graduate student you are bound by the graduate studies policies listed in the Graduate Bulletin. Please read over these policies early to avoid making a serious mistake.

Ombuds Program

In the future, should you need an objective ear to hear out any academic concerns in a confidential advisory manner, you might want to take advantage of the graduate [Ombuds program](#). This program provides independent, informal, and non-partisan counsel to graduate students on matters relating to University experiences or involving dispute resolution or interpersonal misunderstandings, particularly those involving the graduate student's academic program or academic progress. It is NOT part of the university's grievance procedure or judicial system. Rather, ombuds help mediate student problems so that they do not escalate into major issues.

Access to excellent library facilities is essential for a successful graduate education. At UAlbany, we have three libraries that support your learning and scholarship

Collectively, the libraries have more than 2 million volumes and rank among the top 100 university libraries in the U.S. They support access to over 100 web based electronic data bases, including MEDLINE, Science Direct, EBSCO, and INSPEC.

University Library: The largest of the libraries, located on the uptown campus; focus is on the humanities, social sciences, education, and business.

Science Library: Opened on the uptown campus in 1999 (behind the Campus Center); serves the whole campus community but houses collections and offers specialized services for departments of Atmospheric Sciences, Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Physics, Computer Science, Mathematics & Statistics, and Public Health.

Dewey Graduate Library: Located in the downtown campus in the Hawley Building . Supports the curricula in School of Criminal Justice, Rockefeller School of Public Affairs and Policy, the School of Social Welfare, and the department of Information Studies.

IV. Resources for Teaching Assistants

Graduate students who are TAs are encouraged to visit the Institute for Teaching, Learning, and Academic Leadership (ITLAL) for ideas and assistance with their teaching responsibilities. ITLAL serves the UAlbany faculty and teaching staff through programs of instructional, curriculum and faculty development. There are several workshops and events held each semester for all instructors – see their website for details (<http://www.itlal.org/>)

The Preparing Future Faculty Program at ITLAL is designed to assist graduate students with developing the skills requisite for good teaching practice, to help prepare graduate students for the job market, and to facilitate their transition to faculty members. This program complements existing departmental professionalization programs that already give us some “best practices” on campus, while at the same time make it possible for students in departments that do not have such programs to prepare for the role of college or university faculty member.

V. Research

Research is an integral part of graduate education, but it takes different forms across the various disciplines at the University. There are specific regulations that govern research involving human or animal subjects. It is important that you discuss your research interests and projects and seek advice on designing and conducting research studies.

All researchers – faculty and students – must comply with the university policies and federal and state laws and regulations. The Office of Regulatory Research Compliance (ORRC) supports and promotes ethical research practices on campus. Please visit the ORRC website (<http://www.albany.edu/orrc/>) for information on training for research with human participants (governed by the Institution Review Board) and use of animals (IACUC). You must complete the training appropriate to your discipline before conducting any research.

VI. Financial Services & Aid

The Office of Financial Aid (Campus Center G-25) provides assistance with two types of loans for graduate students: federal direct unsubsidized (Stafford) loans and direct graduate PLUS loans.

Graduate Assistantships are allocated to and managed by departments. These assistantships are awarded on a competitive basis, mostly to doctoral students. There a limited number of Administrative Unit Graduate Assistantships that are open to all graduate students (see the Graduate Education link provided above for a listing).

VII. International Education

International students enrich the academic community at UAlbany. Currently, international students make up about 18% of matriculated graduate students. Direct support of international students is provided by the office of International Student & Scholar Services (ISSS): <http://www.albany.edu/iss/>.

International students must check in with ISSS upon arrival. Their office is in Science Library G-40 (email: iss@albany.edu). ISSS assists students with visa status maintenance and health insurance, and provides ongoing advice to international students and visiting scholars. It also provides a comprehensive orientation to all new international students. If you are an international student, and did not attend the ISSS orientation, please contact them as soon as possible.

VIII. Health & Welfare

Student Health Services

[Student Health Services](#) provides on-going, consistent, high-quality primary health care to University at Albany students that promotes the good physical health and well-being to support student success and life long healthy habits.

All enrolled students are entitled to care at the Student Health Services. It is located at 400 Patroon Creek Blvd, a short ride from the uptown campus. Shuttle service is available every 30 minutes from the Science Library and Collins Circle to Patroon Creek. See the [Parking and Mass Transit website](#) for a schedule.

Incoming students who are registered for 6 or more credits must provide proof of immunity to the diseases measles, mump, and rubella. Please check with the Health Center to make sure you have proof of immunity on record.

Counseling and Psychological Services

All enrolled students are also entitled to assistance at Counseling and Psychological Services (www.albany.edu/counseling_center). They offer individual and group counseling and various prevention and health promotion services. Counseling is confidential and offered on a short-term basis to registered students. Costs are covered by your tuition and fees.

Disability Resource Center

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IX. Office of Graduate Education

The [Office of Graduate Education](#) is dedicated to academic excellence in graduate education at the University at Albany and advocates for support for graduate programs and graduate students. The office provides several functions, which fall into two broad domains: Graduate Admissions and Graduate Studies.

Graduate Admissions

The Office of Graduate Admissions, directed by Assistant Dean of Graduate Education and Director of Graduate Admissions Jane Champagne, brought you into the University. They manage the graduate application and admission process for the University and provide oversight for admissions policy.

Graduate Studies

Staff in Graduate Studies are also responsible for getting you out (with your degree). Staff clear all certificates, master's and doctoral degrees, to ensure that they meet the standards of the University and requirements of the degree program.

Under the direction of Vice Dean for Graduate Education Jonathan Bartow, Graduate Studies is also responsible for (1) guiding and supporting faculty efforts to develop and maintain academic program registrations on campus and with SUNY; (2) administering and enforcing academic policies; (3) coordinating and supporting the operation of the Graduate Academic Council; and (4) maintaining the [Graduate Bulletin](#).

Graduate Studies is especially proud of its role in fostering the appreciation of diversity on campus. Assistant Dean of Graduate Studies Betty Shadrick directs and supports activities and programs that support inclusion and diversity across the graduate curriculum. X. Graduate Student Association

The Graduate Student Association (GSA) is a student organization dedicated to assisting and supporting graduate students in all programs. The GSA Executive Board is made up of elected and appointed graduate students. Various committees, also composed of graduate students, are responsible for planning and conducting activities.

The GSA offers campus wide educational, cultural, and social programming for graduate students. It also offers research and travel grants to current graduate students. Travel grants are intended to pay for or offset travel and other costs related to conference and/or exhibition participation. Research grants are intended to pay for or offset costs incurred while conducting sanctioned research.

The GSA Office is located in CC 307 & 308 and offers many services to students, including fax machine, printer and copier, and free local phone calls. The office also has a coffee club and lounge area, offering a place to connect with other graduate students.

The programs and services offered by the GSA are funded by the graduate student activity fee that appears on your tuition bill. All graduate students are members and entitled to privileges of membership. Visit the GSA webpage and get involved (<http://www.albany.edu/gsa/index.shtml>).
