Responsible for overseeing the graduate and undergraduate academic programs in the School of Criminal Justice, including graduate student recruitment, graduate and undergraduate admissions, graduate and undergraduate curriculum, and student performance. Two major accomplishments were negotiating a new funding plan for doctoral students and completing a total revision of the doctoral curriculum. The new funding plan allows the school to commit four years of support to entering students at the point of admission. We were the first unit on campus permitted to do so and are now serving as a model for other units seeking to become more competitive.

Dean, School of Criminal Justice, University at Albany, July 1, 1988-October 31, 1995.
Administrator for academic unit with 14.5 faculty and 4 support staff, with an annual budget of approximately \$1.2 million. At the end of my term, the program had, on average, 135 undergraduate majors, 40 masters students and 100 doctoral students. The School also houses the Hindelang Criminal Justice Research Center, with an average annual sponsored funds budget of \$1.1 million. I served as the chief academic and executive officer, reporting to the Provost of Rockefeller College and the Vice President for Academic Affairs of the University. During my term, the school recruited five new faculty members and maintained its budget and faculty fte despite seven university budget cuts in five years. Recruitment resulted in two historic firsts for the School: the appointment of a minority faculty member and the appointment of three women. From 1988 to 1992 we increased doctoral enrollment from 50 to 100, and increased minority doctoral students from 5% of the student body to 20%.

Community Service Activity

Since July 2000 I have been deeply involved in assisting two local family and youth treatment agencies in Albany, NY, to develop the capacity to assess each of their residential and non-residential programs. My initial academic partner in this endeavor was Shadd Maruna, who left the university in August 2001. In August 2002, Dana Peterson joined the project as co-principal, and she assumed the duties of principal investigator in January 2005. We have received valuable support for this work from the New York State Juvenile Justice Committee (OJJDP funds), as indicated above. However, the resource commitments of the university and the agency partners have exceeded by two-fold the external dollars received. The program operates under a formal partnership agreement between the two agencies and the School of Criminal Justice Hindelang Center.

From August 1996 to December 1999, I worked with the New York State Council of Probation Administrators to assist New York probation departments in the development and implementation of performance measurement in probation. A partnership agreement between COPA and the University was consummated through a memorandum of understanding. The partnership involved the survey of probation constituencies, the development of goals on the basis of multiple demands, and the selection of performance measures that are salient to probation officers and external constituencies.

From August - December 1997 I was the coordinator of a team of five people from the Albany Police Department, the Mayor's Office, the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of New York, and the Albany South End Block Captains Program. The team coauthored the Albany Weed and Seed program proposal. The proposal was accepted in March 1998 and funded in July 1998 for \$275,000/year for five years and refunded in 2004 for five years.

From January 1982 through October 1987, I was heavily involved with Phase Out/Reentry Ex-Offender Residential Program, Inc., a not-for-profit group, incorporated in June, 1982, for the purpose of establishing a halfway house for ex-offenders in the Albany area. The impetus for this project was a proposal to the Albany Area Council of Churches to establish support services for parolees returning to the Capital District. The Council formed a task force, which later incorporated as a separate organization. The Task Force, working with the Council of Community Services of Northeastern New York and the Emergency Shelter Association, determined that 25% of the requests for emergency shelter came from persons with criminal records and that this group of homeless people was the one most frequently denied shelter.

The task force initially requested my services in developing a service proposal for an envisioned residence. In September 1982, I was elected President of the corporation, a position I held until June, 1984, when I resigned to take a one year position at SUNY-Binghamton. I remained active while in Binghamton and rejoined the Board in June 1985, as vice-president and then acting president until June, 1986. I remained on the Board of Directors until October 1986. While my formal position varied during these years, I was legally the Chief Executive Officer for most of that period. In that position I was responsible for authoring or coauthoring a variety of proposals

and contract negotiations and direct supervision of the executive director. Among my more tangible accomplishments were:

1. Proposal for initial funding for Horizon House (co-authored with Lanric Hyland and Shelley L. Kath), accepted by the NYS Legislature, 1983-84, \$70,000.
2. Proposal for continuing funding for Horizon House, accepted by the NYS Legislature, 1984-85, \$75,000.
3. Proposal for transition funding for Horizon House, accepted by the NYS Legislature, 1985-86, \$46,000.
4. Proposal for a Parole Community Resource Center, NYS Division of Parole 1986-87 (co-authored with executive director Kerry Ruiz) \$46,000.
5. Proposal for a Homeless Housing Assistance Program grant (NYS D.S.S.) (coauthored with Kerry Ruiz and Joseph Raggio) awarded October, 1986, \$189,000.

From January 1982 through December 1985, I had from one to 13 graduate students involved in various staff and volunteer positions and for credit under CRJ 689 (Research in Action Settings). My average time investment during my term on the Board was 30 hours/week. The project has been given the Patricia McGuinness Yates award for the outstanding volunteer project in the Albany area 1983, and has been cited in the New York State Legislature as a model for community corrections effort (June, 1985). It remains one of three such projects operating in New York State.
