Note: "Demand reduction" refers to programs and research related to drug abuse treatment, education, rehabilitation, and prevention that are designed to reduce the demand for drugs. "Supply reduction" refers to a wide scope of law enforcement-related activities designed to reduce the supply of drugs in the United States and abroad.

Each year when the President develops the National Drug Control Strategy, changes may be made to existing programs and new programs often are added. The following programs were added to the fiscal year 2009 requested national drug control budget: the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Office of Counternarcotics Enforcement, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Indian Health Service, and the U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs (Source: [FY 2009 Budget Summary](#), p. 6). Some data have been revised by the Source and therefore will differ from previous editions of SOURCEBOOK.

^aThe data presented represent the following types of budget authority: 1996-1999, "actual"; 2000-2007, "final" budget authority enacted in the prior year; 2008, current year "enacted"; and 2009, "requested" for the budget year under formulation. Percents may not add to 100 because of rounding.
