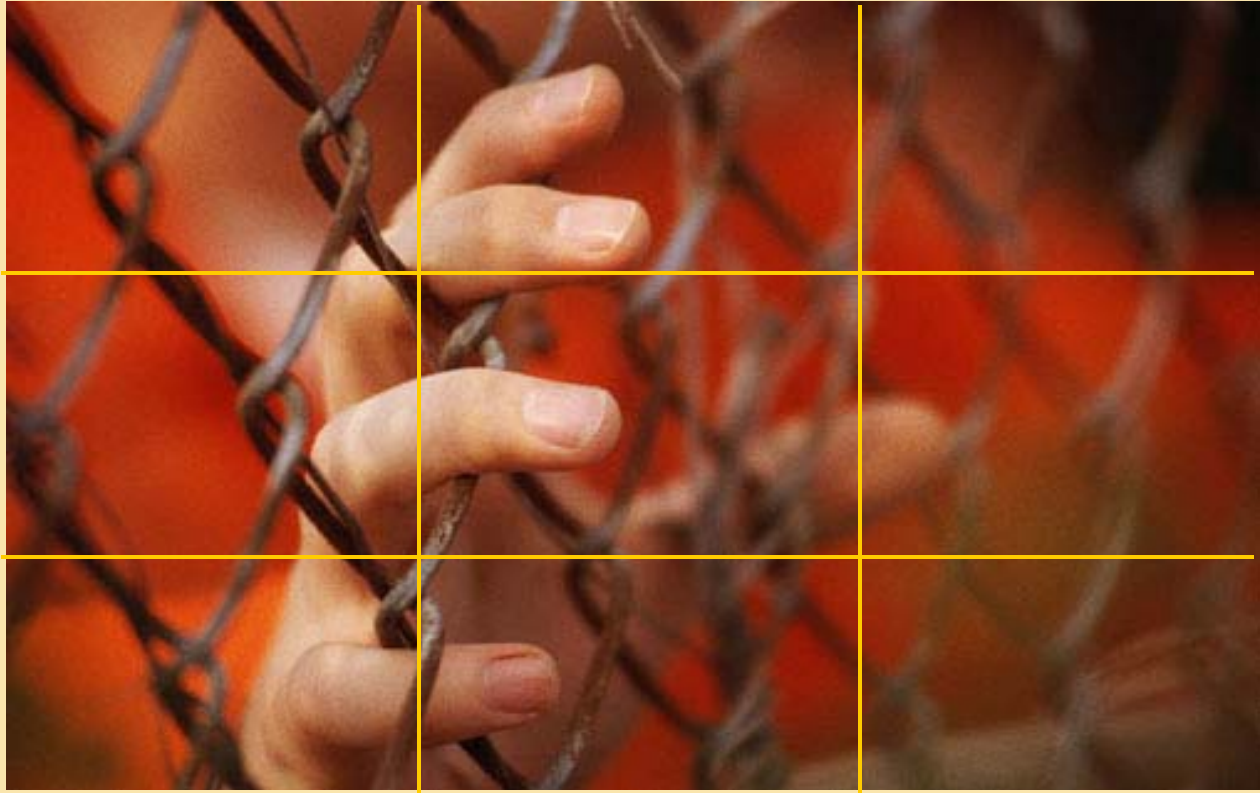




## Prison and Jail Health
