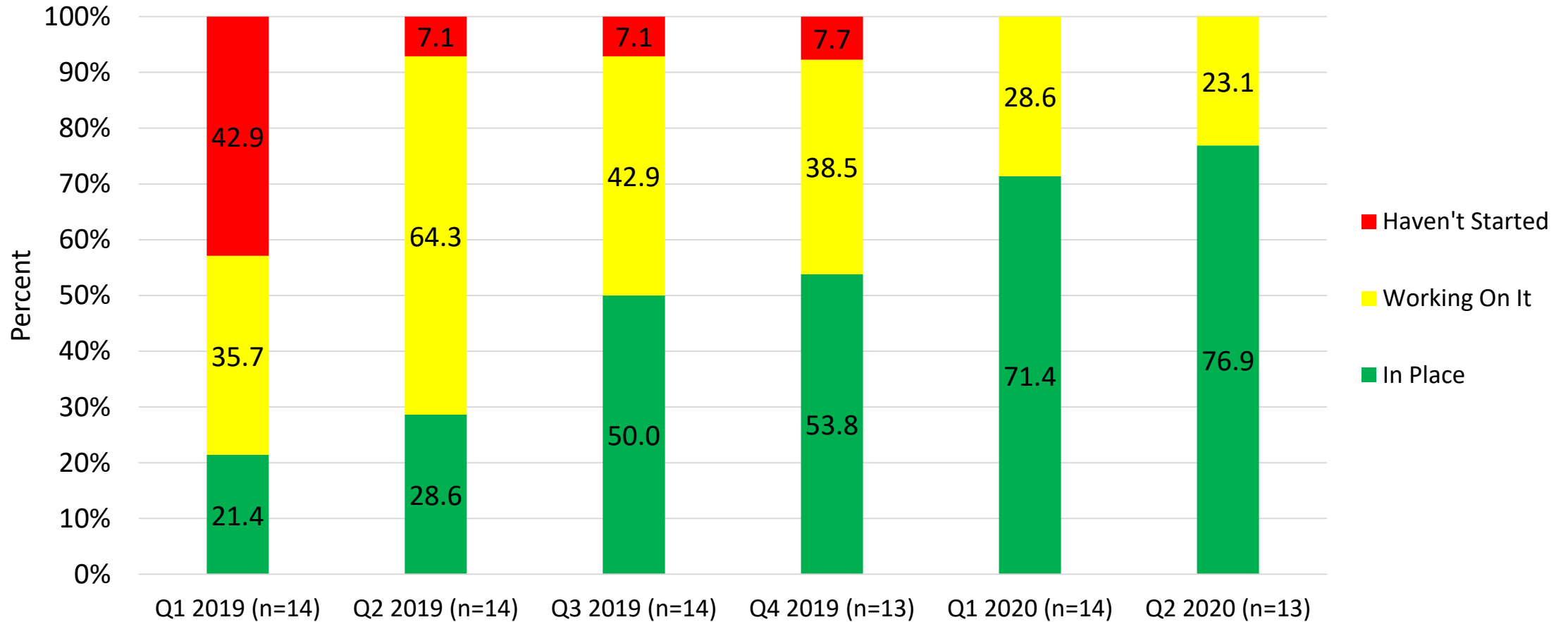

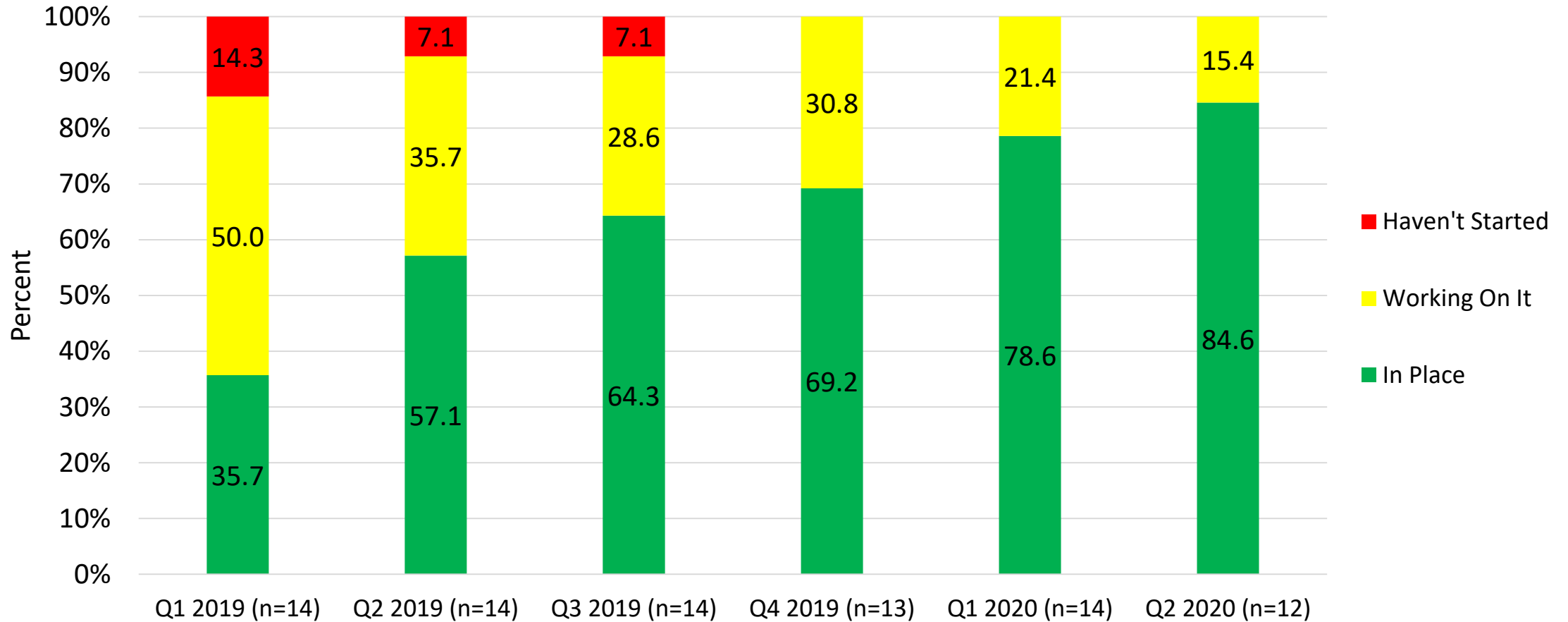
Prenatal Care Clinic Structure Measure: SBIRT

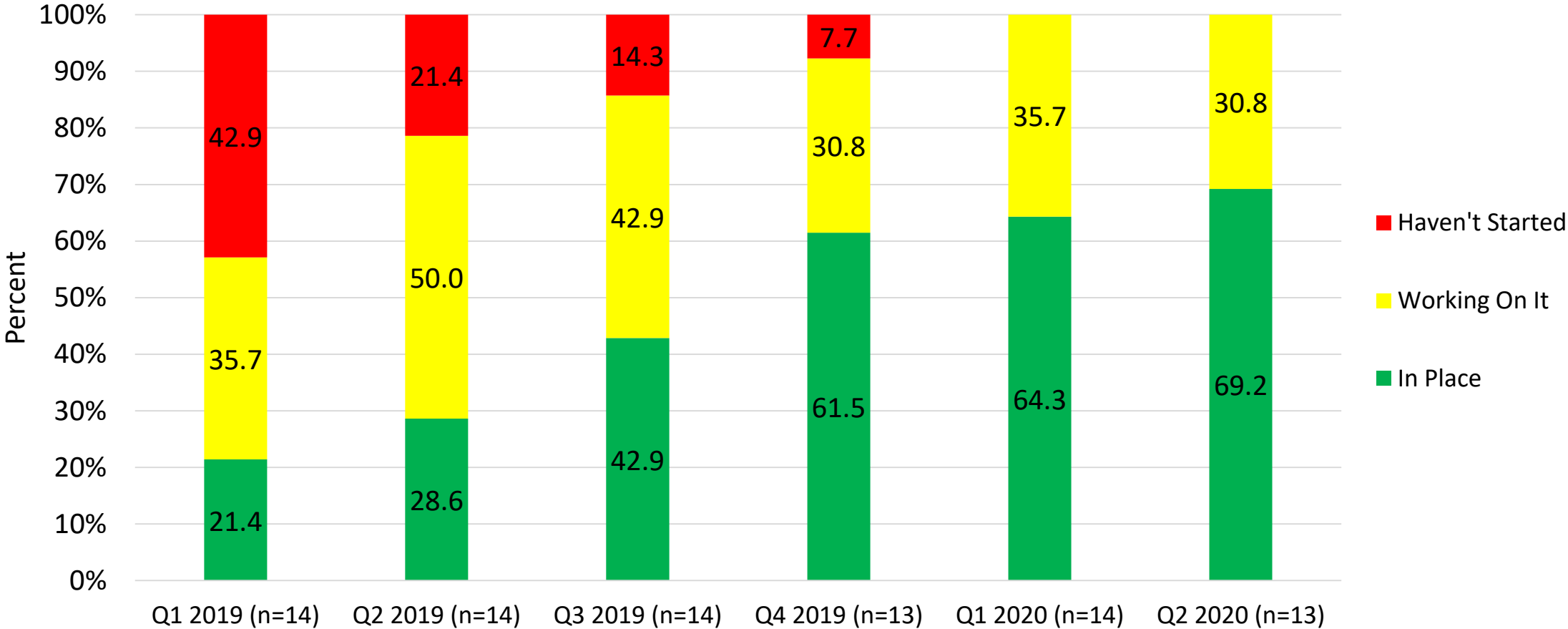

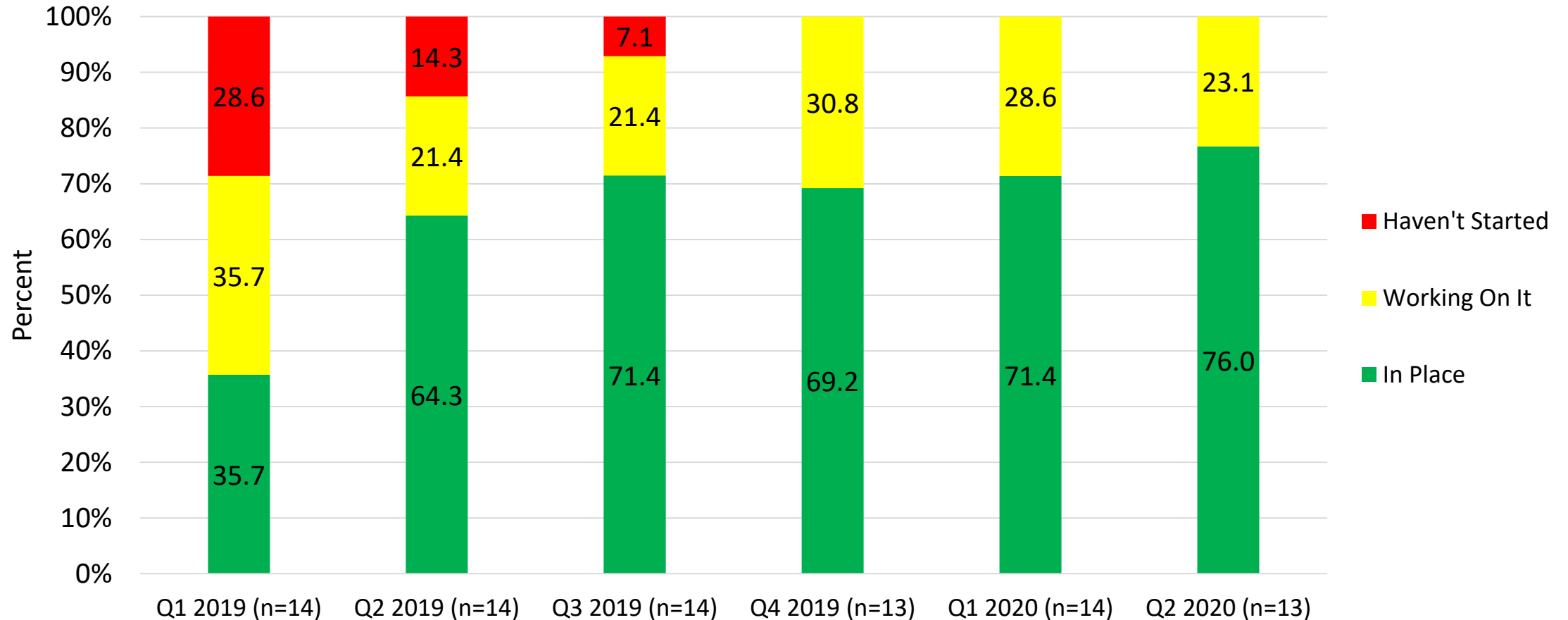
Prenatal Care Clinic Structure Measure: Treatment Resources

Local OUD Treatment Resources Document to map local community resources (MAT/addiction treatment services/behavioral health support) for pregnant and postpartum women with OUD

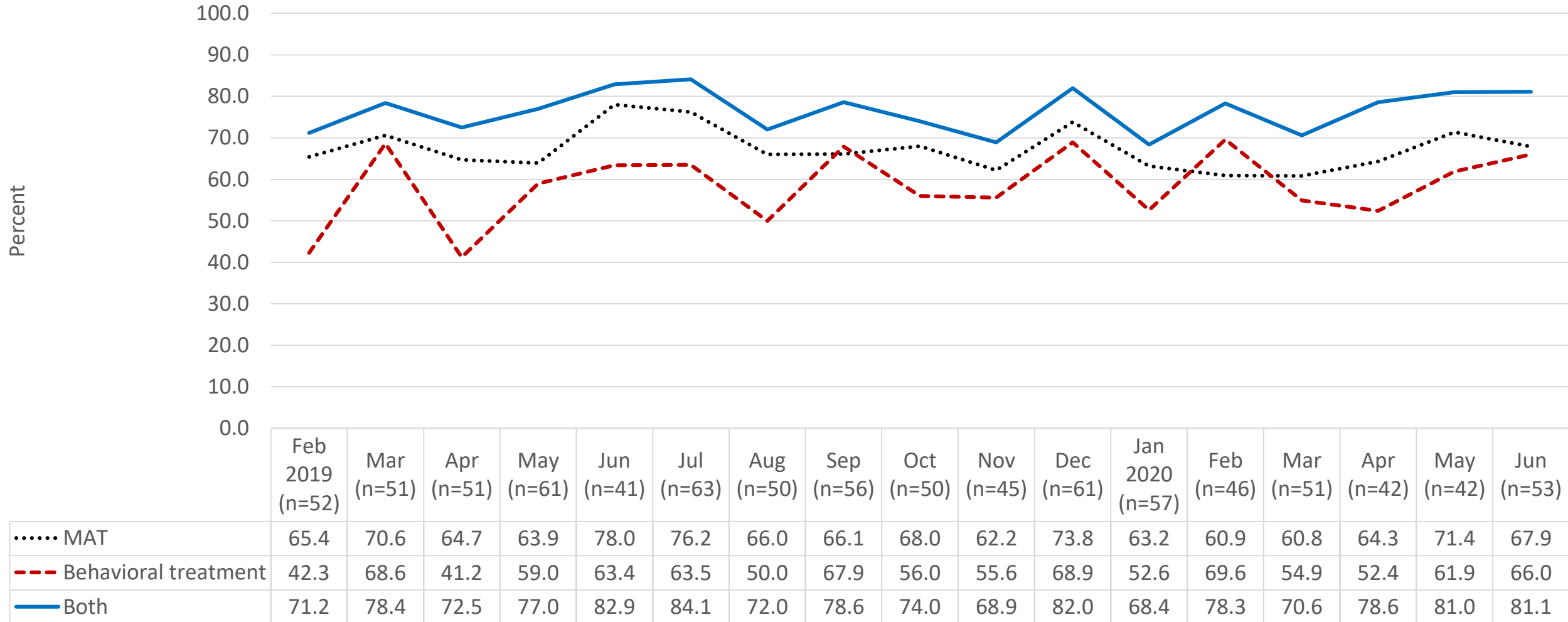

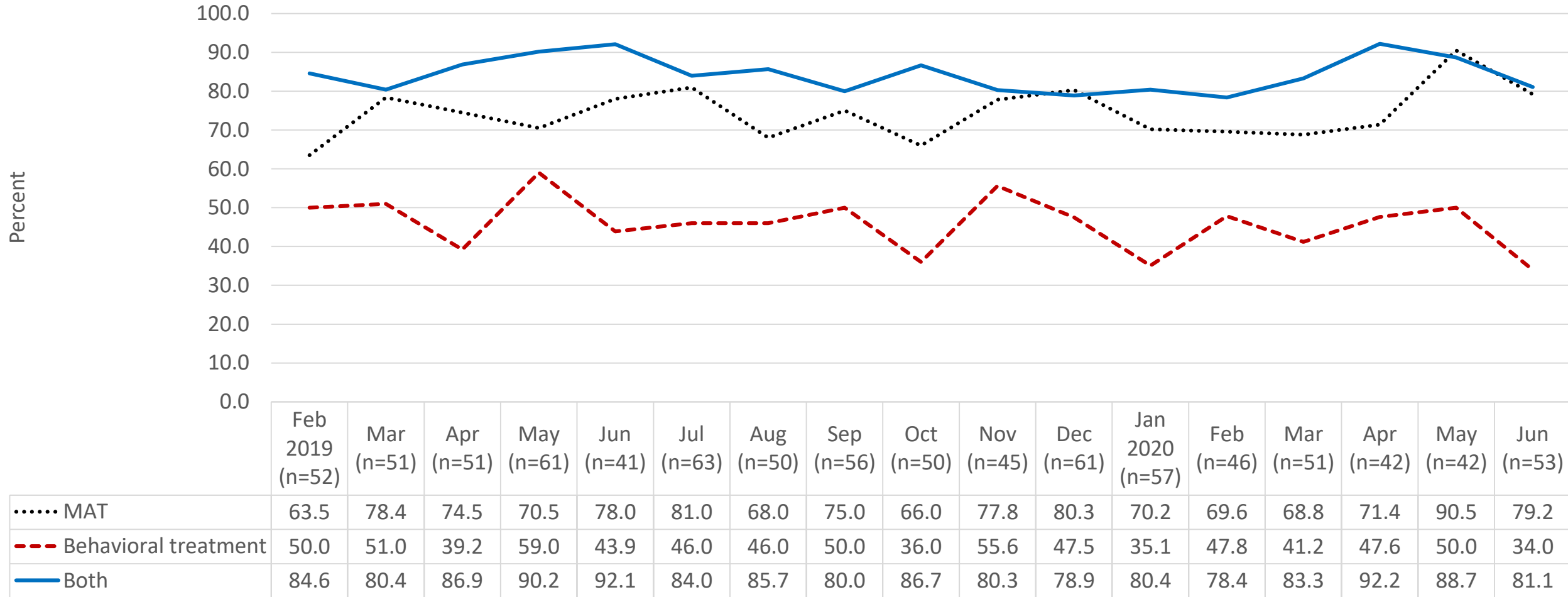

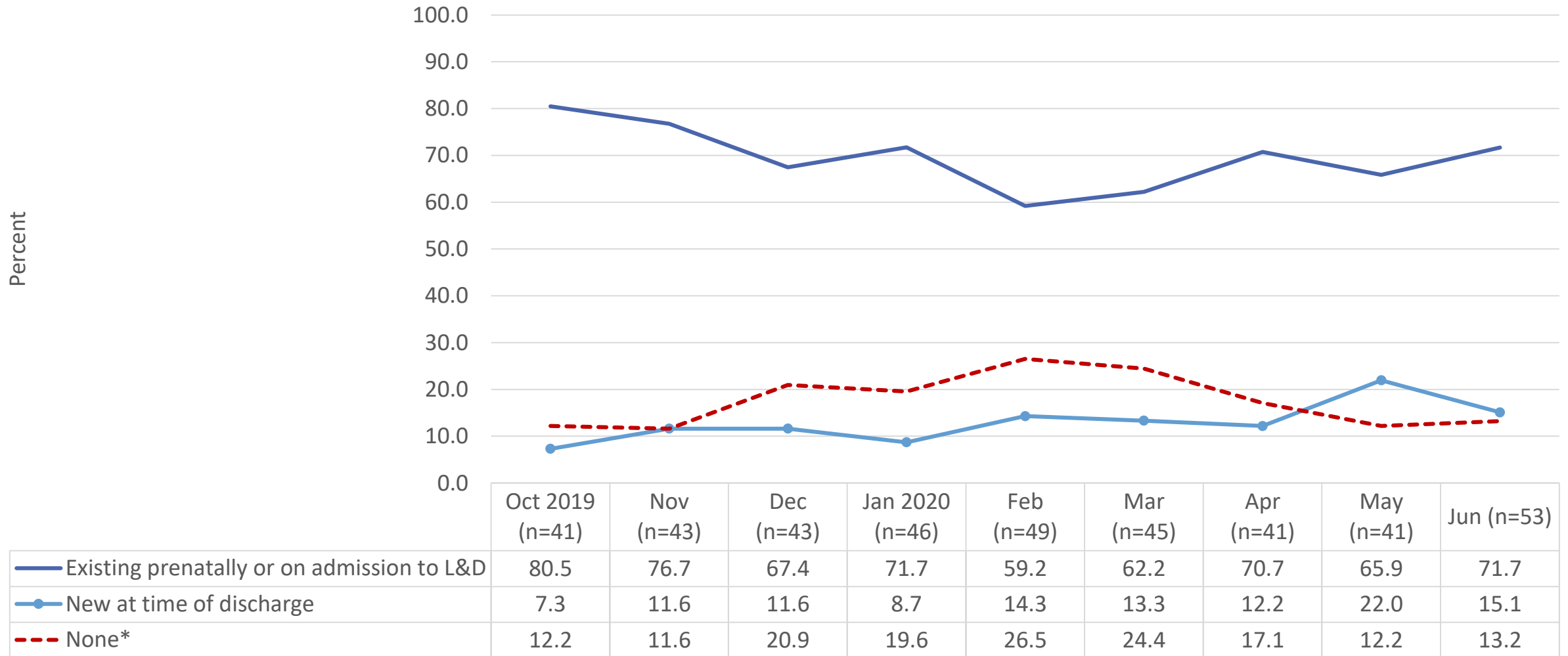
Percent of maternity patients with OUD during pregnancy who received medication assisted treatment (MAT) or behavioral health treatment prenatally

Mother & Infant Tool Revisions

- The addition of an answer choice “N/A – prescribed opioids >30 days in the last trimester, but no OUD diagnosis” to questions 8 & 9.
- Clarifying that inclusion criteria for patients with a positive opioid toxicology test during pregnancy should additionally include an assessment to have OUD.

IMPROVING LIVES BY LEADING A COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM OF ADDICTION SERVICES

Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery

- The NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) is the single designated state agency responsible for the coordination of state-federal relations in the area of addiction services
- One of the nation's largest Substance Use Disorder systems of care with approximately 1,700 prevention, treatment and recovery programs.
- Over 680,000 individuals served per year.
- Includes 12 State Operated Addiction Treatment Centers where our medical providers, nurses, and clinical staff provide inpatient and residential services to approximately 8,000 individuals per year.

Overview of Types of Addiction Services

Crisis Services

Crisis services provide a variety of treatment options designed to provide immediate care for people who are intoxicated or incapacitated by their use of alcohol or other substances. The primary goal of these services is to manage withdrawals from substances, as well as medical and psychiatric complications during withdrawals. Crisis services include detox services, and are also designed to facilitate connections to continued care.

Inpatient Rehabilitation

Inpatient programs provide a safe and supportive setting for the evaluation, treatment, and rehabilitation of people with substance use disorders. These facilities offer 24-hour, 7-day a-week care that is supervised at all times by a medical professional. Inpatient services include intensive management of symptoms related to addiction and monitoring of the physical and mental complications resulting from substance use.

Outpatient

Outpatient facilities provide clinical services for people with an addiction to substances and their families who have been impacted by their addiction. Outpatient services may be delivered at different levels of intensity according to the needs of the patient. These services include counseling, education, and connections to community services.

Opioid Treatment

Opioid Treatment Programs (OTP) are OASAS-certified sites where medication to treat opioid use disorder is administered. These medications can include methadone, buprenorphine, and naltrexone. In addition to medications, these facilities also offer counseling and educational services. In most cases, patients receiving services at an OTP clinic are provided treatment over a lifetime, similar to management of other chronic medical conditions.

Residential Services

Residential services are designed for people who are in need of support in their recovery, and may not be able to participate in treatment without a 24-hour residential setting. Residential services are designed to develop or maintain recovery through a structured, substance-free setting, and can include group support, skills development related to independent living, and other services designed to promote recovery.

BUILDING ON TRADITIONAL PREVENTION, TREATMENT AND RECOVERY PROGRAMS

- **Prevention Resource Centers** work with schools and community coalitions statewide to implement and strengthen evidence-based prevention strategies.
- **24/7 Open Access Centers** and **Centers of Treatment Innovation** increase access to assessments, referrals, and familial support.
- **Peer Engagement Specialists** and **Family Navigators** help individuals and families understand addiction and navigate treatment and insurance systems.
- **Clubhouses** provide non-clinical, drug-free environments for recreation and skill-building.
- **Recovery Centers** offer non-clinical recovery supports in the form of emotional, informational, instrumental (concrete) support and positive affiliation.
- **Housing Providers** help homeless or at-risk families with a history of substance use disorder obtain stable housing and employment, which promotes recovery.
- **Addiction Resource Centers** and **Problem Gambling Resource Centers (PGRCs)** are regional hubs that connect New Yorkers to appropriate services.

Centers of Treatment Innovation (COTIs)

- Centers of Treatment Innovation (COTIs) are innovative program models, implemented across the state designed to expand access to live-saving addiction treatment services for individuals with Opioid Use Disorder, with an emphasis on reaching people using heroin/fentanyl/other opioids who have not been connected to care previously or have been unable to sustain their recovery through traditional treatment approaches. COTIs are developed as community-based models uniquely tailored to meet the needs of the communities they serve. COTIs are comprised of multidisciplinary teams that use peer outreach and engagement to connect individuals to mobile treatment services, linkage to Medication Assisted Treatment, telepractice, and warm-handoff support to different levels of care

Peer Engagement Specialist and Family Navigators

- Peer navigators are individuals who are in recovery or who have personal family experience with recovery
- They use their lived experience to help build rapport and trust with individuals seeking treatment
- They utilize their expertise in addiction and addiction services to provide support, encouragement, and guidance to help link individuals to services

Project PrOMISE

- Three-year program funded through SAMHSA's State Pilot Grant Program for Treatment for Pregnant and Postpartum Women
- Two primary goals:
 - Expand or enhance addiction treatment services to pregnant and postpartum women and their newborns
 - Enhance the state's Infrastructure
- NYS approach:
 - Fund three providers: Lexington Center, Child Center of NY and Crouse Hospital
 - Develop Gender Specific Family Centered Treatment Services

Project PrOMISE

- Establish a connection and working relationship with other services providers in 2 of the following three settings: Healthcare, Local Department of Social Services, Public Housing – to provide for referrals as well as a place for outreach and engagement
- Implement and sustain the use of an Evidenced Based Practice
 - Celebrating Families or Strengthening Families
 - Nurturing Families
- Access to Medication Assisted Treatment
- Implement support services to include but not limited to Peer Supports, transportation, childcare, and other recovery support activities



Maternal Wraparound (MWRAP)

- A pilot funded - SAMHSA's State Opioid Response Grant (SOR)
- Built upon a NJ Model with the goal of providing
 - Intensive case management
 - Wraparound Supports
 - Recovery Supports
- For pregnant and postpartum women using opioids for 6 – 12 months post-delivery
- Four programs were identified: Governor Hospital, Center for Comprehensive Health Practice, Best Self of Western NY, and NADAP

Certified Peer Recovery Advocates in the Emergency Department Curriculum Development

- Hospitals and outpatient providers collaborating on an SOR project to promote buprenorphine induction within an ED with a warm handoff to a Certified Recovery Peer Advocate (CRPA) for engagement in recovery/treatment identified a need for more training to better prepare CRPAs to work within the hospital ED setting
- OASAS accessed CSAT Technical Assistance support to contract with CUNY's Queensborough Community College via OASAS' agent, CCSI, to develop a training and TTT to build statewide capacity for CRPAs to effectively work within the ED setting
- A peer participatory process was utilized to identify 10 topics for the new curriculum including but not limited to: culture of the ED; navigating the hospital setting; relationship building; communication; understanding medical jargon; conflict management; mitigating burnout and resources for referrals



Certified Peer Recovery Advocates in the Emergency Department Curriculum Development (continued)

- A pilot training was delivered by QCC virtually over the course of four days, with two hour blocks each day. Dates were Aug. 24 and 25 and Aug. 31 and Sept. 1. A 3-hour TTT will be held on September 21. The training was attended by 21 trainers and 27 CRPAs, all representing each of the 10 economic development zones within the state.
- Once the trainers complete the TTT, each one will be expected to deliver one free training and to submit training evaluations to OASAS. Two of the trainers were OASAS Learning and Development staff.
