



marks the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the University Art Museum at UAlbany. At its 1967 inaugural exhibition, Painting and Sculpture from the Nelson A. Rockefeller Collection—featuring fifty-three artworks by some of the most influential figures in twentieth-century modern art—Governor Rockefeller stressed the importance of a public university museum that "presents new ideas through art and culture."

More than 400 exhibitions later, the Museum remains committed to the idea that firsthand experience of contemporary art provides a gateway to a larger world. A baseline familiarity with the language of art can open doors and bridge gaps, and the University Art Museum is here to give students, as well as the larger community, the tools to speak that language, understand it, and make it their own. By exhibiting works from both current practitioners and its substantial collections, the Museum continues to play an important role in contextualizing how contemporary art evolves into art history and in turn generates the development of new forms and alternate readings of existing knowledge. Exposing our students to the most rigorous and significant artwork and presenting exhibitions and programs that influence and expand their worldview is our primary goal. They deserve nothing less.

On behalf of the entire Museum staff, thank you for your support as we look toward the next fifty years.

COLLECTION NEWS



he University Art Museum serves as a caretaker for UAlbany's Fine Art Collections, which consist or over 3,000 works of art, with a focus on modern and contemporary works on paper. In addition to museum exhibitions, selected works from the collection are exhibited in public spaces on campus, providing access to the collection for students, faculty, staff, and visitors

space designed to protect and preserve The Art Collections of the University at Albany and to offer a culturally active learning environment for students, faculty, scholars, and the larger community. The space will also be designed to accommodate classes of up to 20 students and small groups. Visiting Artists and Lectures 2017 – Exhibiting artists Dave McKenzie, Sara Greenberger Rafferty and Cameron Martin; art historian Dr. Robert R. Shane, photographer Sara Cwynar, and pre-eminent art critic and poet. John Yau.

Art Lab – A new series of hands-on, interactive art projects led by teaching artist Christine Snyder (MFA '16 and inspired by artists featured in each exhibition. This ongoing series is free and appropriate for all ages

The Creative Life – A collaboration with New York State Writers Institute, UAlbany Performing Arts Center, University Art Museum and WAMC public radio station, The Creative Life brings leading figures in the arts to campus for a conversation with WAMC's Joe Donahue about their creative practice. Upcoming conversations include photographer Frédéric Brenner, choreographer Garth Fagan, and two-time Tony and Grammy winner Patti Lupone. Previous guests included fiction writer Joyce Carol Oates, tap dancer-choreographer Savion Glover, jazz violinist Regina Carter, painter David Salle, and author Lois Lowry.



This Place

February 1 - April 7, 2018

Internationally renowned photographers— Frédéric Brenner, Wendy Ewald, Martin Kollar, Josef Koudelka, Jungjin Lee, Gilles Peress, Fazal Sheikh, Stephen Shore, Rosalind Fox Solomon, Thomas Struth, Jeff Wall, and Nick Waplington capture unfiltered insights on everyday life in Israel and the West Bank. The exhibition is a collaborative project between the Picker Art Gallery at Colgate University; the Wellin Museum of Art at Hamilton College; the University Art Museum, University at Albany, State University of New York; and the Frances Young Tang Teaching Museum at Skidmore College. It will be on view at the four academic museums simultaneously during the spring 2018 semester, with each institution presenting work by four of the photographers. The University Art Museum will be presenting work by Martin Kollar, Jungjin Lee, Thomas Struth, and Jeff Wall.

This Place is organized by Chronicle of a People Foundation, Inc., New York. At all four collaborating institutions, the exhibition is supported by the Teagle Foundation.

Hank Willis Thomas: Black Righteous Space

February 1 – April 7, 2018

Hank Willis Thomas's Black Righteous Space is an interactive installation that features a looping soundtrack combining songs, speeches, and dialogue from more than 50 noted black leaders, musicians, ministers, poets, and celebrities. Their observations on racism, equality, injustice, and life in America are punctuated with a barrage of patterns, including a recurrent Confederate flag recolored in hues of the Black Power Movement. Additionally, a microphone is placed in front of the screen for visitors to speak or sing into the mic during randomized moments of silence.

Master of Fine Arts Thesis Exhibition

May 4 - 20, 2018

The Master of Fine Arts Thesis Exhibition features work produced by candidates for UAlbany Art Department's three-year, sixty-credit-hour program of intensive training and study in traditional and contemporary fine art practices.

Younger Than Today: Photographs of Children (and sometimes their mothers) by Andy Warhol

Curated by Corinna Ripps Schaming June 29 – September 15, 2018

Younger Than Today reveals an innocence and tenderness not typically associated with the work of Andy Warhol in over 60 Polaroids and photographs related to childhood, sibling relationships, and the Maternal. Selected from the Andy Warhol holdings of the University at Albany Art Collections: The Frances Lehman Loeb Art Center at Vassar College: the Neuberger Museum of Art at SUNY Purchase; the Samuel Dorsky Museum of Art at SUNY New Paltz; and the Hessel Museum of Art at Bard College, Younger than Today is part of Warhol x 5, a collaborative series of thematic exhibitions to be held at each institution in 2018. A symposium on the history and significance of approaches to exhibiting Andy Warhol's work will be held in spring 2018 at SUNY New Paltz and Vassar College.

Mickey Mouse has grown up a Cow

Curated by Joe Mama-Nitzberg June 29 – September 15, 2018

Videos by artists including Yoshie Sakai, Frances Stark, and Abbey Williams present differing points of view in addressing the representation of children and parenting and engage in dialogues often attributed to the work of Andy Warhol.

Triple: Alex Bradley Cohen, Louis Fratino, and Tschabalala Self

Curated by Corinna Ripps Schaming June 29 – September 15, 2018

Triple brings together emotionally resonant and highly charged new works by three artists who are redefining the contemporary portrait. Cohen, Fratino, and Self move freely between abstraction and figuration in paintings that celebrate the complexities of identity and personal relationships.
