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asexual adjective

\ (,) ā - 'sek - sh(ə -) wəl \

"The lack of a sexual attraction or desire for other people." People who are asexual may still be romantically attracted to others. "Asexual" is often shortened to "ace."

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bisexual adjective

\ (,)bī-'sek-sh(ə-)wəl \

*"A term that describes
someone who is
attracted to both men
and women, or to more
than one gender
identity."*

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cisgender adjective

\ (,)sis-'jen-dər \

"A term used to describe a person whose gender identity aligns with those typically associated with the sex assigned to them at birth."

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closeted adjective

\ 'klä-zə-təd \

*"Describes an
LGBTQ person who
has not disclosed
their sexual
orientation or
gender identity."*

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coming out

verb

"The process in which a person first acknowledges, accepts and appreciates their sexual orientation or gender identity and begins to share that with others."

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gay adjective

\ 'gā \

"In the past, only men who are attracted to men have used the word "gay." Now, it is common for "gay" to be used by anyone who is attracted to their same sex or gender."

gender noun

\ 'jen-dər \

"An idea created by society (A.K.A. a social construct) that tells us what certain genders are "supposed" to be like, based on a group of emotional, behavioral and cultural characteristics (like how we express our feelings or how we dress)."

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genderfluid adjective

"[A] gender identity label often used by people whose sense of self in relation to gender changes from time-to-time. The time frame might be over the course of many months, days, shorter, or longer, but the consistent experience is one of change."

gender identity noun

"One's innermost concept of self as male, female, a blend of both or neither – how individuals perceive themselves and what they call themselves. One's gender identity can be the same or different from their sex assigned at birth."

gender non-conforming
adjective

"A broad term referring to people who do not behave in a way that conforms to the traditional expectations of their gender, or whose gender expression does not fit neatly into a category."

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intersex adjective

\ 'in-tər-,sɛks \

"Describes a condition in which a person is born with a sex that doesn't fit the typical definitions of female or male due to genetic, hormonal or anatomical differences."

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lesbian adjective

\ 'lez-bē-ən \

*Describes "[a] woman
who is emotionally,
romantically or
sexually attracted to
other women."*

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L•G•B•T•Q•+

"[S]hort hand/umbrella term for...folks who have a non-normative (or queer) gender or sexuality, there are many different initialisms people prefer; LGBTQ is Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender and Queer and/or Questioning (sometimes people add a '+' at the end in an effort to be more inclusive)."

non-binary adjective

\ ,nän-'bī-nə-rē \

"An adjective describing a person who does not identify exclusively as a man or a woman. Non-binary people may identify as being both a man and a woman, somewhere in between, or as falling completely outside these categories. While many also identify as transgender, not all non-binary people do."

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pansexual adjective

\ ,pan-'sek-sh(ə-)wəl \

*"[A] person who
experiences sexual,
romantic, physical,
and/or spiritual
attraction for members of
all gender
identities/expressions.*

Often shortened to 'pan.'"

queer adjective

\ 'kwir \

"[A]n umbrella term to describe individuals who don't identify as straight and/or cisgender [someone whose gender does not align with the sex they were assigned at birth]." While the noun form is often considered a derogatory slur, "queer" as a descriptor has been reclaimed by many as a word of empowerment and is widely acceptable.

As with all terms, please respect individual wishes regarding the non-use of this word.

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questioning adjective

\ 'kwes-chə-niŋ \

"A term used to describe people who are in the process of exploring their sexual orientation or gender identity."

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sex assigned at birth

noun

"The sex (male or female) given to a child at birth, most often based on the child's external anatomy. This is also referred to as 'assigned sex at birth.'"

noun

*"Describes a person's
physical, romantic,
emotional, and/or
spiritual attraction to
another person.*

*Everyone has a sexual
orientation."*

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Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity/Expression (S.O.G.I.E.)

Everyone has a sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression, which is summarized by the term SOGIE. This term applies to everyone, including those who identify as cisgender or heterosexual. SOGIE-minority identities are those that are typically included in LGBTQ+ or queer definitions.



transgender adjective

\ tran(t)s-'jen-dər \

"An umbrella term for people whose gender identity and/or expression is different from cultural expectations based on the sex they were assigned at birth. Being transgender does not imply any specific sexual orientation. Therefore, transgender people may identify as straight, gay, lesbian, bisexual, etc."

transitioning

"The social, legal, and/or medical process a trans person may go through to make their gender identity fit their gender expression, presentation, or sex. This word means many different things to different people, and a person doesn't have to experience all or any of these common transitioning elements to identify as their true gender."*

"[A]n umbrella term traditionally within Native American communities to recognize individuals who possess qualities or fulfill roles of both feminine and masculine genders."
