Great Transformations in American and British Politics

This project aims to extend the analysis of my first book to areas beyond urban policy and to broaden my conceptual frame by examining the way neoliberalism operates alongside other political traditions. In particular, this project tackles three critical policy areas —the political economy, the welfare state, and mass incarceration—to build an account of the multiple political orders (neoliberalism, liberalism, and conservatism) that drove late twentieth century politics in the United States and the United Kingdom.
