Note: These data are from the Juvenile Residential Facility Census (JRFC), a biannual census of facilities in the United States in which juvenile offenders under age 21 are held. The census is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. The JRFC does not include adult prisons or jails, nor does it include facilities used exclusively for mental health or substance abuse treatment for dependent children. Juvenile facilities on tribal lands are included. The 2004 JRFC collected data from 3,257 juvenile facilities; 2,809 of those held offenders younger than age 21 on the census date, Oct. 27, 2004. The remaining 448 reporting facilities held no juvenile offenders on that date.

A single bed is counted as one standard bed and a bunk bed is counted as two standard beds. Makeshift beds (e.g., cots, roll-out beds, mattresses, and sofas) are not counted as standard beds. Facilities are counted as over capacity if they reported more residents than standard beds or if they reported any occupied makeshift beds. The data shown in this table include both public and private facilities.
