Administrative facilities are capable of holding prisoners in all security categories.

^bA number of institutions are components of Federal Correctional Complexes (FCCs). At FCCs, institutions with different missions and security levels are located in close proximity to one another. For FCCs, the Source provided the total number of staff for the entire complex with no breakdown by institution. The number of staff at each FCC is as follows: Beaumont, 885; Butner, 1,004; Coleman, 984; Florence, 944; Lompoc, 671; Oakdale, 519; and Petersburg, 566.
