Note: "Demand reduction" refers to programs and research related to drug abuse treatment, education, rehabilitation, and prevention that are designed to reduce the demand for drugs. "Supply reduction" refers to a wide scope of law enforcement-related activities designed to reduce the supply of drugs in the United States and abroad.

Each year when the President develops the National Drug Control Strategy, changes may be made to existing programs and new programs often are added. The National Drug Intelligence Center was moved to the U.S. Department of Justice and therefore added to the fiscal year 2010 requested Federal drug control budget (Source: **FY 2010 Budget Summary**, p. 8). Some data have been revised by the Source and therefore will differ from previous editions of SOURCEBOOK. Also, the totals presented above will differ for certain years from those shown in table 1.14.2010 because the totals for Federal drug control spending are updated in later editions of the Source but the detail for the agencies is not.

<sup>a</sup>Beginning in FY 2004, category includes two additional programs: Prescription Drug Monitoring and COPS' Methamphetamine Lab Cleanup. Also included beginning in FY 2006 is the Domestic Cannabis Suppression Program (formerly included in the Drug Enforcement Administration).

<sup>b</sup>Includes the Small Business Administration's Drug Free Workplace grants and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Drug Impaired Driving Program.
