Note: The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) cooperates with other law enforcement agencies through their Criminal Alien Program (CAP) to ensure that incarcerated criminal aliens are placed in removal proceedings. CAP is responsible for investigating and arresting at-large criminals and the identification, processing, and removal of criminal aliens held in Federal and State prisons, and local jails in the United States. These data include only persons who had a criminal conviction. The program seeks to minimize the amount of time an alien is detained by DHS after release from prison and before removal from the United States.

- <sup>a</sup>Includes manufacturing, distribution, sale, and possession of illegal drugs.
- <sup>b</sup>Includes entry and reentry, false claims to citizenship, and alien smuggling.
- <sup>c</sup>Includes hit and run and driving under the influence.
