



Writers Institute, a workshop for college and post-college writers which also takes place on the Skidmore campus during the month of July. By bringing the top student writers in the country together to work extensively with professional writers, the SYWI provides young artists with recognition, respect, opportunities for artistic development, and peer support. Participants are expected to write extensively and complete pieces of work in three genres. Computers will be available for writing and revision. Students will present readings of their work at the end of the week, and their poems, essays, and stories will be published in an anthology.

The SYWI is open to any high school student entering the 10th, 11th, or 12th grade in the fall of 2012. Based on creative writing samples that the applicants submit (see online application for details), approximately 36 students will be selected to participate in the program. Full and partial financial aid awards are available for participants based on need.

FACULTY

Kathleen Aquero's most recent book of poetry is Investigations: The Mystery of The Girl Sleuth (Cervena Barva Press, 2008). She has published three other volumes of poetry, including Daughter Of, with Cedar Hill Books, and edited three anthologies of multicultural literature from the University of Georgia Press. Kathleen Aguero is a Professor of English at Pine Manor College in Chestnut Hill, MA, and she teaches in the low-residency MFA and undergraduate programs there.

Liza Frenette is an assistant editor at the monthly magazine, NYSUT United, where she writes features, human interest stories, article about workers rights, environmental education, and breaking news. She has twice won the Mary Heaton Vorse award, the highest writing award from the Metro Labor Communications Council of New York City, for feature writing. Vorse was an activist and writer, often covering workers' rights. Liza Frenette is the author of three novels for middle-grade children, Soft Shoulders, Dangerous Falls Ahead, and Dead End.

Bob Miner worked for *Newsweek* and has written for the New York Times, Washington Post, Village Voice, and Esquire. He has published two novels—Exes and Moth er's Day—and is finishing up the third novel in this series, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, as well as writing nonfiction about Istanbul, Turkey. Since 1980 he has taught writing for the University at Albany and Empire State College, as well as for Skidmore College, Syracuse University, Siena College, and the College of St. Rose.

William B. Patrick is the founder and director of the New York State Summer Young Writers Institute. His most recent book is Courageous Learning: Finding a New Path through Higher Education, published in October, 2011. He is also the author of Saving Troy: A Year with Firefighters and Paramedics in a Battered City, Roxa, an award-winning novel, We Didn't Come Here for This, a memoir in poetry, and two other collections of poetry, These Upraised Hands and Letter to the Ghosts. Mr. Patrick is currently on the faculty of Fairfield University's MFA Program in Creative Writing.

HOW TO APPLY

The SYWI is open to any high school student entering the 10th, 11th, or 12th grade in the fall of 2012. Specific instructions are available there. A complete application consists of the following: a completed online application form; \$40 application fee; best writing sample – any genre(s) (poetry, fiction, nonfiction, play, screenplay) up to a maximum of 15 pages (typed, double-spaced). If applying for financial aid, a completed Financial Aid Application must also be included.

Submission of the online application and supporting materials is required by April 1, 2012.

Writers accepted into the Summer Young Writers Institute will be notified after April 20, 2012.
